

"Licensed" is the correct spelling for the past tense verb and adjective, regardless of region. The difference between "licence" (noun) and "license" (verb) exists only in British English; American English uses "license" for both.

- **Licensed:** This spelling is used in all cases to describe the past tense of the verb ("He was licensed to sell alcohol") or as an adjective ("a licensed driver").
- **Noun (British English):** "Licence" is the correct spelling for the noun, meaning the official document or permit.
 - *Example:* "He has a driver's licence."
- **Verb and Noun (American English):** "License" is used for both the verb and the noun.
 - *Example (verb):* "The state will license the driver."
 - *Example (noun):* "He needs a driver's license."
